WHAT IS JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT?

Junior Achievement (JA) is the nation's largest organization dedicated to giving young people the knowledge and skills they need to own their economic success, plan for their future, and make smart academic and economic choices. JA of Washington is funded by over 3,600 corporate and private contributors as well as special events.

PROGRAM REACH — Meeting You Where You Are

In 2019-20, JA of Washington reached 35,235 students in over 1,273 classrooms and out-of-school locations. In response to the pandemic, JA shifted many of its programs to the digital sphere. Platforms such as Google Hangout, Zoom, Schoology, MS Teams, and more are being used to connect volunteers, educators, and students with JA's virtual programs to meet them where they're at, no matter their school situation. The goal for 2020-21 is 35,415 students.

VOLUNTEER MODEL

JA of Washington's over 5,000 volunteers come from all walks of life, including business experts, college students, parents, and retirees. These dedicated individuals serve as job shadow hosts, classroom/ virtual and JA Capstone program mentors and volunteers, and are the backbone of our organization.

PROVEN SUCCESS

JA uses independent, third-party evaluators to gauge the impact of its programs. Since 1993, evaluators have conducted studies on the effectiveness of Junior Achievement's programs.
